On July 11, 1995 the U.S. and Vietnam normalized diplomatic relations and the story of PeaceTrees Vietnam began. For the past 25 years, we have worked alongside Vietnamese counterparts to assist those whose lives and livelihoods continue to be threatened by the explosive remnants of the Vietnam War. PeaceTrees' commitment to landmine removal, mine risk education, survivor assistance, economic and educational development and citizen diplomacy has helped create safe land and successful communities. It has brought former adversaries together in the spirit of peace, friendship, and reconciliation and your dedication and support has made this work possible. *Thank you*.

Over the past 25 years we have made meaningful progress in addressing the legacy of war in Vietnam. To date, we have:

- Cleared over **1,687 acres** of more than **117,617 unexploded bombs and mines**, and returned land back to individuals and families in Vietnam.
- Assisted 216 individuals and 62 families to adjust to life after an UXO accident.
- Educated over **138,000 individuals** on the risks associated with UXO.
- Built 19 kindergartens, 12 libraries, 2 community centers and 100 family homes, and provided the 3,187 children who have attended a PeaceTrees kindergarten daily nutritious meals at school.
- Distributed **2,314 scholarship**s to children impacted by mine accidents and ethnic minority children with financial need.
- Planted over **44,000 trees** through the volunteer efforts of more than **900 participants** in PeaceTrees' Citizen Diplomacy program.

Together, thanks to your generosity and support and the dedication of our community, we have made meaningful progress toward our vision of a Vietnam completely cleared of dangerous unexploded ordnance and communities fully supported in their goals for safety, resiliency, education and economic success. However, there is still much work to be done. In our 25th year, we are renewing our commitment to this life-saving vision. Through our work – and with your help – we will join our Vietnamese partners in

actions of reconciliation, friendship, and renewal. Will you join us in this effort to continue our work in Vietnam?

Your generosity returns war-torn land to safety and productivity so children can walk to school joyfully, farmers can till their land without the risk of striking a bomb, and communities can continue to flourish for generations to come.

When we receive your donations, we put them to careful use:

\$150 - will clear dangerous unexploded ordnance from up to 275 square meters of land

\$300 - provides scholarships for 3 mine accident affected children in central Vietnam to attend primary school

\$700 - funds a team of 10 Explosive Ordnance Disposal technicians to work for one day

\$1,270 - builds a playground at a PeaceTrees Kindergarten on safe land
